Attendance at 96 diversity, inclusion and community events, directly engaging with 4000 members of the public (222 hours)

Hosting of, partnering on and attendance at 6 National Hate Crime Awareness Week events

Hosted our annual learning event: 'Hate Crime Isn't Funny' – utilising comedy and improv to deliver 'Active Bystander' training and promote the Manifesto



Facilitation of 51 training sessions, totalling 132 hours with organisations and stakeholders across NI

Tailored training delivered in schools, colleges, universities and young people organisations across NI

Development and delivery of enhanced OCN Level-3 'We Stand Together' in February 2025 – delivered to groups in Belfast & Mid-Ulster

Development of 2 'Mini-Manifestos' for these local areas as a result of the training



Hosting of 4 Hate Crime Stakeholder Forum Meetings (ongoing; quarterly)

Chairing, joining and attending 12 working and subgroups dedicated to addressing hate crime & supporting victims

Filming and publishing of 12 interviews with public figures and stakeholders dedicated to better addressing hate crime

Design and delivery of the 'We Stand Together' social media campaign reaching an audience of 148,874 across social media platforms



142,669 page visits to HCASNI website and 'NI Hate Crime Manifesto'

Increase of 356 hate crime referrals, providing support to more victims than in any previous year

Maintaining over 80% victim satisfaction despite vast increase in referrals and increasing pressures

Direct engagement with many groups, victims, advocates and stakeholders after significant signal crime issues covered in the media e.g. summer anti-immigration protests

Expand and deliver further training, building more localised 'Mini-Manifestos' to tackle local issues

Delivery of additional annual and partnered National Hate Crime Awareness Week events

Continue to increase self and third-party referrals to the service to support an increasingly larger pool of people affected by hate crime
